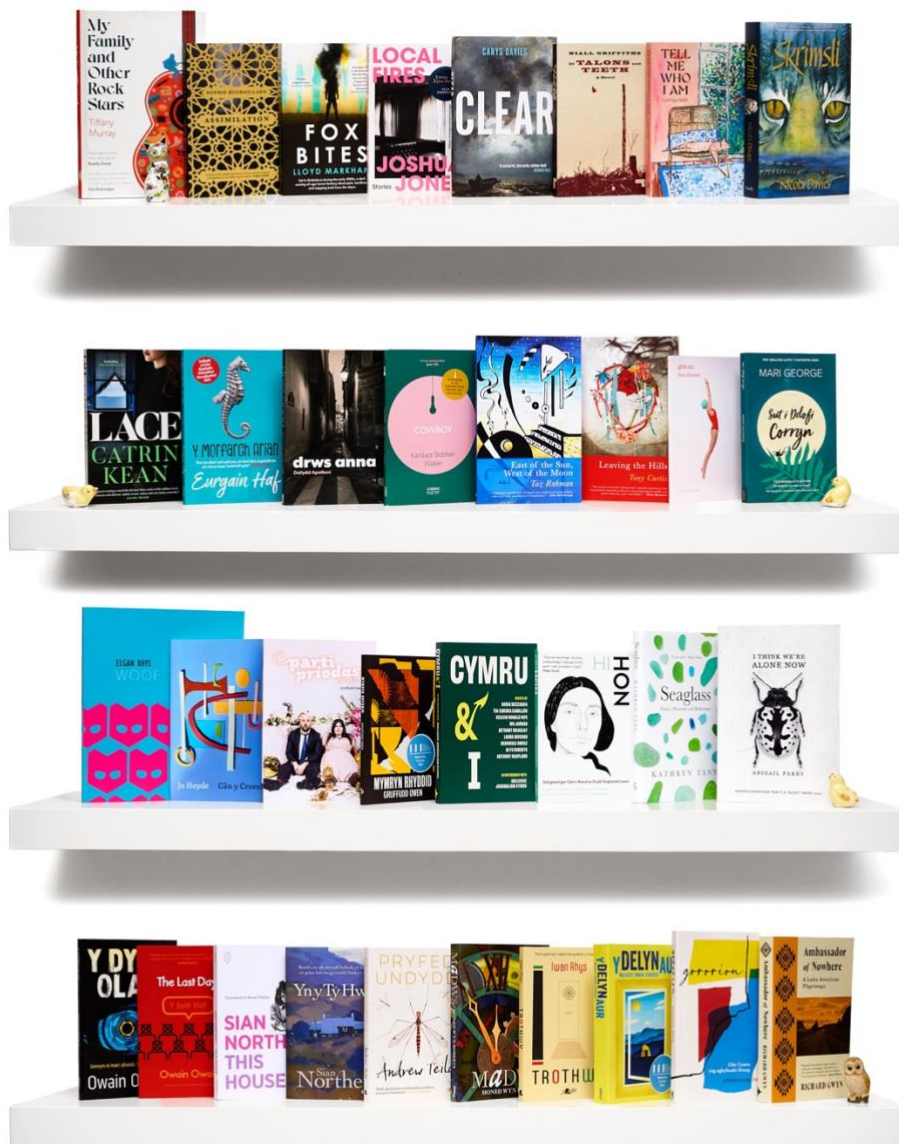

Chloe enters the local talent show, seeking fame, fortune and a ticket out of town. Meanwhile, her mother, Angie, wakes up hungover on the morning of her fourth wedding day. William ponders his impending autism diagnosis through the lenses of Descartes and Hollywood heartthrob Clive Owen. Jimmy, the hot-headed proprietor of a firework shop, rages at the emergence of a rival store, as his ex-wife considers the existential ramifications of her uncanny resemblance to TV cleaning personality Kim Woodburn.

Local Fires sees debut writer Joshua Jones turn his acute focus to his birthplace of Llanelli, south Wales. Sardonic and melancholic, joyful and grieving, these multifaceted stories may be set in a small town, but they have reach far beyond their locality. From the inertia of living in an ex-industrial working-class area, to gender, sexuality, toxic masculinity and neurodivergence, Jones has crafted a collection versatile in theme and observation, as the misadventures of the town’s inhabitants threaten to spill over into an incendiary finale.

In this stunning series of interconnected tales, fires both literal and metaphorical, local and all-encompassing, blaze together to herald the emergence of a singular new Welsh literary voice.

About the Author

Joshua Jones (he/him) is a queer, autistic writer and artist from Llanelli, south Wales. He co-founded *Dyddiau Du*, a NeuroQueer art and literature space in Cardiff. His fiction and poetry have been published by Poetry Wales, Broken Sleep Books, Gutter and others. He is a Literature Wales Emerging Writer for 2023 and is currently working with the British Council to connect Welsh and Vietnamese queer writers. *Local Fires* is his first publication of fiction.

The newcomer is John Ferguson, an impoverished church minister sent to evict Ivar and turn the island into grazing land for sheep. Unaware of the stranger’s intentions, Ivar takes him into his home, and despite the two men having no common language, a fragile bond begins to form between them. Meanwhile on the mainland, John’s wife Mary anxiously awaits news of his mission.

Against the rugged backdrop of this faraway spot beyond Shetland, Carys Davies’s intimate drama unfolds with tension and tenderness: a touching and crystalline study of ordinary people buffeted by history and a powerful exploration of the distances and connections between us. Perfectly structured and surprising at every turn, *Clear* is a marvel of storytelling, an exquisite short novel by a master of the form.

About the Author

Carys Davies is the award-winning author of three novels and two short story collections, whose work has been translated into nine languages. Her debut novel *West* (Granta, 2018) won the Wales Book of the Year Fiction award, was Runner-Up for the Society of Author's McKitterick Prize and was shortlisted for the Rathbones Folio Prize. Her short stories have been widely published in magazines and anthologies and broadcast on BBC Radio 4. Davies' second collection, *The Redemption of Galen Pike*, won the Frank O'Connor International Short Story Award 2015. Born in Wales, she now lives in Edinburgh.

Of Talons and Teeth

Niall Griffiths

An historical novel set in Wales before the Industrial Revolution, as human love tries to flower amidst squalor and serfdom.

Wales, a mining village, pre-industrial revolution, its inhabitants oppressed by both Chapel conformist impulses and the predations of a new kind of capitalism being born.

Sion, a metalworker, strikes up an illicit relationship with Katherine, the wife of the mine owner’s personal dogsbody. And so begins the struggle of non-transactional and non-exploitative human love to be recognised in a place bent on the destruction and negation of that very thing.

This shattering novel is a mix of political anger, historical excavation, Celtic mysticism, praise of the human impulse to love and rage at avarice and exploitation. Griffiths plumbs the depths of language in *Of Talons and Teeth*, as he seeks to explore that moment when human beings and the natural beauties around them were turned into mere chattels; when Mammon became the only god worth worshipping.

About the Author

Niall Griffiths was born in Liverpool, studied at Cambridge, and has lived in Wales for over a quarter of a century. An established novelist and professor of creative writing, his work has been translated into twenty languages, adapted for the screen and widely reviewed. His works include *Grits*, *Sheepshagger* and *Stump*. His novel *Broken Ghost* (Jonathan Cape, 2019), which tackles themes of austerity and social breakdown, was selected for our 2019 Bookshelf, and won the Rhys Davies Fiction Award and Wales Book of the Year Award in 2020.

Charlotte, young and fiercely independent, leaves the constraints of her Parisian childhood for Wales, running away from a traumatic event. Hoping to find peace and somewhere to rebuild her life, she is confronted with a growing sense of fragmentation and soon unravels.

Her mother, Marianne, well-travelled and with a colourful past, is keeping a terrible secret. She tries her best to conform her family to French middle class expectations when all at home is far from ordinary.

Wilson, a Nigerian man with a ticket to a new life studying at a New York university, falls victim to the French immigration system and finds himself stranded in Paris awaiting a visa that never comes.

Assimilation is a story of unravelling family secrets, belonging, betrayal and inherited trauma that will transport readers through layers of time and place, carefully steered by the author's compelling prose. Following her lauded debut *This is Not Who We Are* (Seren, 2022), Sophie Buchaillard returns with another novel set against the backdrop of significant political and humanitarian events, and – by questioning how we view migration today – presents us with an important book for our time.

About the Author

Sophie Buchaillard is a Franco-British author based in south Wales, who writes contemporary fiction that reflects on the anxieties of our age, using movement and migration to connect history with our reality. Her short stories and essays have appeared in a wide array of literary magazines and newspapers. She also writes about the environment under the handle #plasticfree. Her first novel *This Is Not Who We Are* (Seren, 2022), which focused on the 1994 genocide of the Tutsi in Rwanda, was shortlisted for the 2023 Wales Book of the Year.

Grief, solitude, and the inner call to be freed from her past are the threads that beautifully and tightly intertwine in this novel.

Anna has lived alone for decades. She is cocooned by, and marooned in, an isolated cottage called Nant yr Aur in the Welsh mountains. The arrival of Siôn, a young man who seems strangely at home in the house, leads to an unpicking of Anna's past. As Anna's relationship with Siôn develops, her perspective on the solidity of her past shifts. Uncertainty, distortion, illusion and subtle betrayal are gradually exposed. Ultimately, a quietly devastating revelation changes the lives of both Siôn and Anna.

Quietly understated, Sian Northey's first novel for adults sensitively explores the fine line between security and confinement, and a house's influence on its occupants. With its strongly realised characters and sense of place, and lyrical, beautifully paced style, this short novel is a little gem.

About the Author

Sian Northey is an author and literary translator based in north Wales. She is the author of three novels for adults – including *Rhyd y Gro* (Gwasg Gomer, 2016) which was selected for our 2016 Bookshelf – one poetry collection, three short story collections, several scripts, and numerous children's and young adult novels. Amongst Sian's translations into Welsh are the memoir *The Journey is Home* by John Sam Jones, and Alys Conran's award-winning debut novel, *Pigeon*. She recently translated Lee Newbery's *The Last Firefox* (Penguin Random House, 2022) under the title *Y Llwynog Tân Olaf* (Firefly Press, 2022).

In the early 1900s in Wicklow, Ireland, the lives of six-year-old Mary and her siblings are torn apart when their father dies leaving the family penniless. Mary's mother is forced to travel to Dublin to find work. She places her children in an orphanage for a short stay, which turns into years. Many years later Mary settles in Cardiff with her Welsh/Bajan husband Louis, and is thrilled at the arrival of their first child, Teresa. But the birth of the baby dredges up long hidden memories that Mary must confront before she can bond with her daughter.

Kean deftly recounts Mary’s story – a tale inspired by her own grandmother – with the skill and compassion readers have come to expect from her award-winning debut, *Salt*. Tackling issues of race, poverty and belonging, *Lace* is a beautiful, heart-wrenching look into the impossible decisions a mother has to make to save her children, and the impact of trauma on the next generation.

Catrin Kean was awarded a place on the Hay Festival Writers at Work scheme for emerging writers from 2016 - 18. Her short stories have been published in *Riptide Journal*, *Bridge House Anthologies*, *The Ghastling*, and *Syncopation Journal*. What happens to ‘lost’ musicians? This accomplished debut novel from award-winning musician Georgia Ruth is woven together to her fourth album, ‘Cool Head’, by a song: the haunting ‘Tell Me Who I Am’.

Jude Lewis is about to be rediscovered, in more ways than one.

Life for this self-described ‘former musician’ has been rather disappointing. Achieving success as a young man with his debut album, the intervening years have not been kind. Stage fright and self-loathing render him unable to perform and gradually, he disappears. Occasionally mentioned in the odd music magazine or on Reddit as something of a relic, and contacted only by the most tenacious of fans, he is – in the eyes of the world, at least – lost.

But what happens to ‘lost’ musicians?

In this accomplished debut, Georgia Ruth explores the role of music and community in building, and rebuilding, a life. The release coincides with Georgia’s latest album, ‘Cool Head’, and both the novel and album are bound together by one song: the haunting ‘Tell Me Who I Am’, which is written by the novel’s main character, Jude.

About the Author

Georgia Ruth is a musician, presenter and author from Aberystwyth in west Wales. Using folk influences to create a truly unique sound, her debut album *Week of Pines* won the Welsh Music Prize in 2013 and was nominated for two BBC Radio 2 Folk Awards. Having collaborated over her career with some of the biggest names in Welsh music – including the Manic Street Preachers, Gwenn0, and Euros Childs – her latest album, *Cool Head*, is on the longlist for the 2024 Welsh Music Prize. The Last Day | Y Dydd Olaf

Owain Owain, translated from Welsh by Emyr Wallace Humphreys

A science fiction cult classic, *The Last Day* is more than a moving call to arms for speakers of minority languages facing extinction; at its core, it's a tragic human-scale story played out between the few figures who could have stopped the madness before it was too late. It is, moreover, a meditation on themes like free will, artificial intelligence and the socio-historical processes that contribute towards the death of a nation. These themes are as relevant now – if not more so – as they were when the novel was written in 1976.

With science fiction tropes recalling Philip K. Dick, Kurt Vonnegut and, more recently, Olga Ravn's *The Employees*, philosophical reflections in the vein of Dostoyevsky's *Notes From the Underground*, and its postmodern form, *The Last Day* is a testament to the depth and creativity of Welsh literature. Its translation into English is long overdue.

About the Author

Owain Owain (1929 – 1993) was a writer, physicist and language activist. He founded *Tafod y Ddraig*, the Welsh Language Society newspaper which remains a cornerstone of Welsh-language activism, as well as the ubiquitous 'Dragon's Tongue' logo. A prolific and eclectic writer, his biography *Mical* (1976, Gwasg Gomer) won Literature Wales's Book of the Year award. His novel *Y Dydd Olaf (The Last Day)* was the inspiration for musical artist Gweno Saunders' 2014 album of the same name. Since then, it has been translated into Polish and Cornish, and was republished in Welsh in 2021 by Gwasg y Bwthyn.

About the Translator

Emyr Wallace Humphreys translates from Portuguese and Welsh to English, and from English to Welsh. A graduate of the MA programme in Translation Studies at University College London, he has had literary translations published in journals such as *The White Review*, *The New Welsh Review* and *Joyland Magazine*. He is a two-time nominee for Deep Vellum's Best Literary Translations Anthology. This is his first full length book translation.

We all have our own mirrors, the glass that we peer through to try to make sense of the world, and no two mirrors are the same.

Iestyn Llwyd is a translator who lives and works in a small town in north Wales. When he receives a phone call from a stranger asking him to translate his memoirs into Welsh, he begins to lose himself in the story. As the line blurs between reality and the words on the page, Iestyn is plunged into a hedonistic life in Paris where he is introduced to the luminous, passionate Anna, and Joni Zlatko – a rolling stone of a character who gathers no moss.

Questions abound as Iestyn is drawn ever deeper into Anna, Joni and the mysterious author's world: who is this stranger after all, and why his insistence that Iestyn alone must translate this story?

Dafydd Apolloni's first novel is a philosophical mystery and a unique exploration of identity, pushing at the boundaries of language, memory and friendship.

Will she survive the lost eleven days between the calendars?

This multilayered piece of fiction, packed with adventure and humour, also has a visual appeal, featuring illustrations of the icons, plants and recipes that underpin Martha's work as an apothecary. In the hands of this experienced author for young adults, *Madws* is an exciting and deeply satisfying read, with broad crossover appeal.

Sioned Wyn Roberts is a native of Pwllheli but lives in Cardiff. She worked for the BBC and S4C for many years, specialising in children's programmes.
